MARITIME CANADA CLIMATE SUMMARY November 2021

All Time Daily Rainfall Records Tumble Across Eastern Nova Scotia and PEI

Temperatures across the Maritimes were near to slightly above normal – most stations in the 0 to +2C range continuing the positive anomaly for 2021. However, November 2021 will be remembered for the damaging torrential rainfall event which affected eastern Cape Breton on the 22nd. Storm rainfall totals of 292.4 and 276.5 mm were recorded at two stations near Ingonish causing numerous road and bridge washouts on the Cabot Trail. Winds with gusts in excess of 100 km/h accompanied this rainfall event resulting in numerous power outages. Overall, for the month, precipitation amounts were variable ranging below average for western NB and NS to significantly above for eastern NS and eastern PEI. Ingonish Beach recorded an astounding 454.9 mm for the month - 240% of normal! Parts of NB saw the first significant snowfall of the season with falls in the 15 cm range recorded in the north. Sea surface temperatures continued above normal with coastal positive anomalies of close to 5C.

Daily Temperature Records

Compared to some other months this year "only" 10 daily maximums were set – 9 in NS, 1 in PEI and none in NB. In NS records were set on the 13th in Shelburne and Liverpool with 17.2 C. On the 19th, 16.2 C was recorded at Ingonish Beach. No new record lows were set across the Maritimes during the month. Mention should be made of the 19 new daily precipitation records set in NS for the month. Three stations in Cape Breton received over 100 mm on 22/23rd with Ingonish Beach recording an astounding 232.8 mm on the 23rd.

Other Significant Events (information provided by Climate Services, ECCC)

November 12-14: A frontal system crossed the region and brought rain and strong winds to the Maritimes, along with very mild temperatures to parts of NS where record temperatures (17-19 C) were set at multiple stations. Winds gusted to 110 km/h at Brier Island 98 km/h at Greenwood, and 94 km/h at Baccaro Pt, with others above 90 km/h.

November 15-16: A developing low-pressure system crossed the Maritimes into the Gulf of St Lawrence providing the first snow of the season for northern areas of NB (5 to 17 cm) and NS (a few cm). Winds gusted to over 90 km/h along the coast of NS..

November 21-24: A significant low pressure system brought torrential rain and strong winds to the region with some coastal flooding. Impacts included power outages, widespread flooding, and washouts. Record daily rainfall amounts were set on November 22 across eastern Nova Scotia. Storm totals over southeast NB, PEI and mainland NS reached 50 to 125 mm. Rainfall totals across parts of Cape Breton were extreme with reported amounts reaching 150 to 290 mm. Two stations near Ingonish reported 276.5 mm and 292.4 mm, the greatest amounts for this event. Winds gusted above 100km/h in eastern Nova Scotia with max gusts of 140 km/h in parts of Cape Breton.
